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Step #4: Cheap pots!


* Reuse glass jars! Check your cabinets & fridge at home, work, makerspace, etc, for old/expired stuff, compost it, and scrub off labels.

* Reuse metals: cans & tins!

* Community Thrift on Valencia is the best for weird glass & ceramic containers of all kinds. (it also has cool queer history - Tavern Guild)

* Make a Craigslist alert for garage/estate sales nearby, close enough to carry stuff home. Ask at the sale if they have more plant pots to bring out!

Step 3: dirt?

Get cheap garden soil from Grocery Outlet or the closest place to your apartment since you don't have a car to carry it.

Flowercraft is really nice, just over the hill, but Lowe's has cheap perlite (like the white specks). Good to add to cheap dirt for drainage, easy to carry on a bus because it's light.

You can wear your mask when mining your wildfire roots. That's ok!

Step 1: don't buy plants

I live in the Mission, where there are tons of succulents along sidewalks. (More suburban or fancy or foggy places might not have so much joy.)

How to plant jade pieces!

- let end dry if it's not already - put in dirt. - medium light (not full sun). - water once or twice a week. - wait a few weeks! it will get wrinkly while it grows roots. that's ok!

Look for dropped pieces!

* Bring a plastic bag everywhere for your finds! Grocery Outlet bags are perfect.

* Jade plants drop a lot of pieces - look underneath (YAY)

* Ask friends if you can take cuttings from:

- succulents
- spider plant babies
- vine-looking plants
- geraniums

don't snap off pieces without asking! that's not as much fun as gathering trash!
